



STATEMENT FOR TYLER, TEXAS:

[This message is from Ashley Pérez, the author of the novel OUT OF DARKNESS.]

Dear Tyler readers and leaders,

My name is Ashley Hope Pérez, and I am the author of OUT OF DARKNESS. I am also a real person—a Texan, a mom, a literature professor, and a former Texas high school English teacher with a heart for serving students.

Because literature engages with the world and the world is often an ugly place, passages from virtually any book can be made to sound "inappropriate" when pulled out of context or described in sensational terms.

What if I told you about a book with many pages of erotic poetry, a book with graphic descriptions of male genitalia, a book where a father consents to his daughter being gang raped while he enjoys an evening with guests?

All of these descriptions of the Bible are factually true, but they are also incomplete and misleading, and they do not do justice to the Bible's complexity or value. In the same way, recent challenges to my book and others have ignored the intentions of each book as a whole, and the messages of hope, moral courage, and connection that accompany the hard realities we examine.

OUT OF DARKNESS takes place in 1937 and sheds light on an important but little-known event in East Texas history, the New London school explosion. It invites readers to engage with the hardships other Texans have faced. It depicts young people struggling for dignity, joy, and respect in a difficult time. After all, 1937 was a time in Texas history when segregation, terrorization, & lynchings were part of non-White Americans' daily experience. Boys did sometimes speak crudely about women—especially women of color. Black Americans faced harsh discrimination and exclusion from opportunities, as was the case in New London, where Black kids could not attend the New London School.

I write about those historical realities to show the depths of harm they caused. I portray friendship, loving family, community, & healthy relationships because they, too, are part of my characters' world.

I wrote OUT OF DARKNESS because I believe that silence about painful issues causes harm. This was true for the survivors of the explosion, many of whom suffered in silence for decades before coming together to talk about their experiences. It is also true for women who experience sexual assault, like the main character in the novel.

I wrote OUT OF DARKNESS to put the focus, for once, on the story of those who are often pushed to the edges of our history books, like the students I taught in Texas and their families.

I wrote it to show that drawing beauty out of suffering is one way we transform our world.

The book removal efforts of the last few years criticize books like mine for doing what literature does: exploring the whole range of human experience and inviting readers to imagine the humanity of people different from themselves. Sometimes that means going to painful places. Parents and teens need to have choices about what they read. We each exercise discretion by what we choose to read or not read. That is where parental discretion and discernment is exercised. But please do

not let a handful of folks limit access to a work of literature because they dislike it. This interferes with a core function of libraries, which is to create a space for choice and exploration.

Instead, leaders can respond to sincere community concerns about what their kids and teens are reading without disrupting other students' learning or access to books. There are many excellent resources that

help adults talk with their young people about what they're reading, so that books become an opportunity for sharing values and talking about difficult situations.

Certainly OUT OF DARKNESS isn't for everyone—no book is. But OUT OF DARKNESS speaks in a unique way to experiences in East Texas history. I know that is a book that matters to someone in your community because I hear from readers all the time about how the story matters to them. (Please see below.) For someone, it is the book that makes history come to life and inspires deepened care and engagement in community. That reader deserves to be able to find it in your library's teen collection.

Dear Ashley Hope Perez.

My wate's father in taw was present in the New London explosion of March 17, 1937. He was 15 years old at the time of the explosion. He was not severely injured and was anie to climbing out of a classroom window. He had 4 other siblings and all survived. One sister was sent to the office for some task at the time of the explosion. Everyone in her classroom died.

My wile is father, Joe, was a Pan Am captain and his older brother was a 4 star general in the Air Force. The other 3 sublings all lived productive lives but all have passed away at this point. Joe wrote an autobiography of his life with a many page long resount of the school disaster. The fact he was 15 and half years old. Boy Scout and only minor injuries he spent lime searching for survivors and collecting the dead.

My wife and I were listering to NPR and heard a review of your book. New Lendon school disaster was mentioned and that your book was blacklisted in some parts of the country. We each said we MUST read your book. Joe a failner worked in the oil fields drank frequently had some family connections to the KKK. Racism was certainly commonplace but the Joe and his siblings seemed

Your book was hard to read at times but I know our country struggled with equality for all races and still does. We need to accept we have failed as a nation much of our existence but if we hope to improve we must come to terms with those short comings.

Here's the review I just left: "Reality can be disturbing. Heavy. Traumatic. But one of the purposes of art is to show us reality - the beautiful and the ugly. The best art brings together our intellect and our feelings, so that we don't just view reality dispassionately, we feel it. Powerful fiction gives us the opportunity to not just learn about experiences not our own, but in some way, to feel we are experiencing them, too.

Out of Darkness gives us that, which is perhaps why it upsets some people. We don't want to know harsh truths about the racism in our history, and we certainly don't want to have to feel we are experiencing it! The author doesn't just give us a window to peek into another world, she allows us to be inside different characters, feeling their joy, their hopes, their fears. I am all churned up. This is what good literature does to a person.

I'll be sharing this book with my young adult children. They are 8th generation white Texans, and their grandfather grew up in East Texas at the time of this story. It is good for them to be churned up, too, to imagine stories outside the ones they have grown up hearing. To understand that reality is not limited to their own experience."

I just finished your book Out of Darkness. The second I finished, I looked up your social media. I felt the urge to let you know how much your work moved me. You managed to write a story so full of love, loss, pain, fear and stregth. You wrote a historical novel about dark sides of American history - ans still we should not forget that parentification, racism, sexual abuse of minors still happen today. It is so important to open our hearts and minds to these topics. Through your words could feel on my skin how helpless, powerless and lost your children protagonists felt at the mercy of adults and of the events. The awareness of this pain can help us understand, change and help.

I was so shocked to read about the negative reactions and book bannings. Even more shocked to read about the hate letters you received. The people writing these remind me of the angry mob at the end of your book. These letters are not justifiable.

Still, I cannot keep thinking: what did they loose, what do they fear to be so angry and scared? Or do they fear your book because they feel guilty and cought when they read about racisms (if they read the book at all?).

I am a psychotherapist. You surely already know, but from my point of view your book is not a threat but precious for every teenager that will have the occasion to read. It may and will be very painful. But many life lessons are. Thank you to writers and artists that help us express and process our emotions with their work.

I will not comment on the nonsense of the book being pornografy. I just must lough over the thought that every teenager out there knows where and how to find true pornography. And these angry parents and grand parents move mountains to ban a book because their children could read "cornhole". Oh boy.

Thank you for this powerful story, it is a true gift. I imagine how tiring the debates and letters must be for you. Please do not give up.

The reason I am submitting these excerpts is ensure the librarian and collections department are well aware of what they are making accessible to minors. I would definitely recommend this book to the parents of a minor so they are aware of what is being purchased by the library and placed within easy access to their children.

Yes. I have read the Kirkus reviews and Printz Award reviews and a few other. Printz describes this 'award-winning' book as a 'bittersweet romance'. The Tyler Public Library describes it in a similar fashion, completely omitting the explicit, vulgar and graphic scenes of rape, masturbation and inappropriate sexual encounters. I believe that these reviews are misleading and actually can encourage children to read this book, only to have them exposed to age-inappropriate content. I have also read other online reviews that detail portions of the actual excerpts from the books. Finally, I read the book myself and can personally attest to the inappropriate content that should not knowingly be made accessible to minors.
